Studio Spectacular Concert

On Sunday 2nd April, students performed at the Studio Spectacular Concert in Pulteney Grammar School's Wyatt Hall. Of all the Suzuki concerts we hold, this one is definitely a favourite for many students. Not only do students play pieces from the Suzuki repertoire in single-instrument and multi-instrument groups, but there is always a fun piece outside the Suzuki books to learn and perform together. The most exciting part is that each studio prepares and performs a special item of its own, often adding costume items to complete the act. Of course, all the playing is met by a very enthusiastic applause from family and friends.

Teachers very carefully curate all aspects of the concert, so that every student, from beginner to advanced, can join in. Even parents/caregivers have the opportunity to perform on stage, sometimes using tiny student instruments, much to their children's delight.

Importantly, the concert helps students feel incredibly proud of their hard work and motivated to continue learning. Some look forward to the next time they can play together with their friends. Others are inspired to practise hard so that they can play the more advanced pieces at the next concert. Students often finish the concert with a special sense of belonging to their own studio and the wider Suzuki community.

President's Report Term 2 - May 2023

Welcome back to term two. I hope you all had a relaxing and enjoyable holiday. The beginning of a new term is a good opportunity to re-establish goals for the next few months.

Here are some reminders for practising with your children:

Start with a small manageable task of a new piece and practise it until it becomes completely natural.

Don't add a new task until the first has been polished. Then put the two tasks together and make sure they are being played fluently.

Continue this way with each new challenging section, and the piece will be learnt very quickly and thoroughly.

Don't forget to practise the revision pieces. This increases the level of ability to then play the new pieces.

There are three important factors when practising. Practise new pieces, revise pieces and always prepare one for a concert.

It is important that a solid technical foundation is established and this only occurs through constant repetition.

Practise slowly and remain calm, exercising patience, as this will keep your child stress free.

Always be enthusiastic and acknowledge each new step with praise.

Love, patience and nurturing are three important aspects when working with your child.

Remember the result of a piece is measured on its quality, not by the number of pieces perhaps being played poorly. Every piece in the repertoire is important and if the students can play the lower level pieces well, then they will be able to progress through to the harder pieces with the same standard. They will learn the discipline of approaching each new piece in the same way.

Understanding this process leads to a high level of performing, not only technically, but musically.

At this point I would like to thank parents for their dedication and commitment to the Suzuki philosophy. You are prepared to take the time out of your busy lives to give your children an experience beyond their school curriculum.

Music produces sensitivity in children and raises their self-esteem, especially after performing in concerts. You are sharing the musical journey with your child as well as being supportive of the challenges that they confront when learning new pieces.

This term there is a graduation concert in June. I know many of our students will be preparing for that important event. Please bring your family and friends to watch the performances. Entry is free for audience members.

Enjoy your time spent with your children when practising. This is an opportunity to have that special one-on-one time to create a bond between you and your child, which is so important for their nurturing.



Sydney Suzuki Festival 2023 by Connor T

Recently, I flew to Sydney with my cello to participate in the 2023 Sydney Suzuki Festival. It was three full days of cello tutorials, play-ins and performances. It was an amazing experience and I look forwards to returning again for next year.

Flying to places with your instrument is always a great experience. You look to the side and you can see your instrument right there on the seat next to you. This is what it is like transporting a cello interstate.

Once we arrived in Sydney, we caught the train to the hotel located in the vibrant and modern suburb of Chatswood. The train network is so extensive, you can get almost anywhere in Sydney in no time. Chatswood is a massive suburb. There are two huge shopping centres, both larger than Westfield Tea Tree Plaza and the hotel was located right in between both of them.

Think of it as the winter festival we have in Adelaide but much larger and with ten times the amount of people. My group was the Book 9+ Class and we spent most of our time working on a few set pieces. The Haydn Cello Concerto in C Major 1st movement, the Prelude and Allemande from the 1st Bach Cello Suite, and the 3rd Brandenburg Concerto as part of the senior orchestra. Each day, we had five sessions (each 1 hour) and a concert.

We started each day with the orchestra playing the Brandenburg Concerto. We then had a play-in with all the cellos, which was a good opportunity to practise pieces from previous books, which a lot of us had forgotten. After a short 30 minute break, we then had a tutorial for technique in our class (Book 9+) and then another tutorial for Bach. We had lunch and then had a concert.



Solo at the Afternoon Concert with my SA teacher Therese On the first day, there was an afternoon concert which most people including myself performed in, and on the second day there was the Gala Concert which featured a range of different instruments including flute and piano. After these, we had a tutorial for Haydn with Sally-Anne Brown, the visiting teacher from New Zealand. On the last day, there was the closing

concert, where each group performed the pieces they were working on and the piece as a combined orchestra.

The festival was a fun experience and it was great doing so much playing and learning of different things. We worked on certain pieces, worked on technique and improved our orchestral skills. The closing concert was a great way to round off the 3 days.

After the festival, there were still three days left to explore Sydney, but my old cello was too small and I needed a new one. It ended up taking two days to find and buy the cello. On the first day, I tried over 30 different cellos at two different stores! I ended up finding a cello that I liked and bringing it back on the plane.

Later that day, I went to the Opera House to watch German cellist Nicolas Altstaedt perform the Elgar Cello Concerto in the main concert hall, which I had never been to before. The Sydney Symphony Orchestra also performed the Shostakovich Symphony Number 10. It was a great concert and amazing to watch in the Opera House.

On our last full day in Sydney, we went to do some sightseeing. We caught the train across the harbour bridge and walked across the massive city. At night, we caught the ferry across the harbour to Milson's Point, where there was a spectacular view of the Harbour Bridge and the Opera House. The next day we went back to the city one last time for lunch and then caught the train to the airport.

The Sydney Suzuki Festival was a great experience and enjoyable. It is very fun and you learn a lot from it. I would recommend for more people to go next year

The Practice Battle by Katherine Quirk

Having benefited from the Suzuki method during my own childhood, I was determined to give my children the same beautiful experience. However, I quickly learned that being a Suzuki parent is one of the toughest jobs I have ever taken on.

Adhering to Suzuki's philosophy, I have immersed my children in music, regularly listening to recordings, attending live performances, and participating in Suzuki events. While Suzuki believed that practice should be enjoyable, some days this is easier said than done! To ensure that practice is completed, I have had to get very creative. Here is a brief list of some games I have tried.

1. Lucky Dip

Incorporating review into daily practice can be made more enjoyable by turning it into a game. A simple lucky dip is a great way to add an element of excitement for children, and kids find it a breeze to get through practice using this method. I bought these stars from Officeworks, but anything will do.




2. Hopscotch

For a fun game when reviewing the Twinkle variations, we like to play hopscotch. Each variation is assigned a number (e.g., Busy Busy Stop Stop is number 1), and when playing hopscotch, each time you land on a number, you have to play that variation. It's worth noting that this game can be time-consuming, so be sure to factor in enough time for it.




3. Board Games

One of my kids' favourite games is a simple board game that I created in just a couple of minutes. It's easy to modify the contents as the child progresses. To play, we roll a dice and move our game pieces accordingly. The objective is to complete each activity five times. It's a fun way to keep things interesting and interactive for my child.



4. Barrel of Monkeys

Another fun game involves the use of the classic children's toy, Barrel of Monkeys (you may have a set lying around in a toy cupboard somewhere!). Choose a challenging bar or section to practise and each time your child completes it successfully, hang a monkey off one of the pegs. The objective is to see if you can build a chain long enough to reach the floor. It's a fun way to motivate your child and make practice more exciting.


5. Little toys

A handy item to have on hand are three to five small toys (you can use anything you have on hand). Set a goal, such as playing a line with a perfect bow hold. Each time the student forgets to meet the goal, remove one of the toys. If all of the toys are removed, the student has to start over. This game is a fun and interactive way to encourage your child to pay attention and meet their practice goals.



6. Bingo

A final example of a fun and engaging game to try is Etude Bingo. My daughter, Matilda, used to struggle with her Etude practice and would become frustrated and upset. However, when I introduced her to Etude Bingo, she suddenly became much more engaged and interested in practising her Etude. I found Etude Bingo online, but there are many other games available if you search for them. It's a great way to make practice more fun and interactive for your child.



Being a Suzuki parent is hard work, with the combined challenges of creating an immersive environment, attending lessons and group classes, and ensuring practice sessions are productive and enjoyable. When you have three Suzuki kids at home like I do, everything is multiplied by three, so practice can take a long time. To ensure this time is effective, I have to be fully present and engaged.

It's hard work, but worth it in my view. From cutting and pasting games and practice books to driving to lessons and concerts, every moment spent is an investment in my children's musical education and brings me immense joy and pride.

Showcase Concert Auditions for Featured Artists 2023

Suzuki SA's annual Showcase Concert in September is a spectacular celebration of South Australia's rich and diverse Suzuki program. Students from every instrument and of all ages and abilities will perform in groups and ensembles on the impressive stage of Elder Hall at the Adelaide University. The Showcase Concert is also a special opportunity for the more advanced students to perform either as a soloist or as part of a small ensemble. To be a featured soloist or small ensemble member, the student must submit a video audition.

Auditions for Solo and Group Items

Students currently studying any instrument with a registered Suzuki teacher and who are current members of the Suzuki SA Association may audition to perform as a featured artist in the Showcase Concert. Students must be studying the Suzuki method on this instrument in order to audition. Soloists and small ensembles (no more than 12 players) are all welcome to audition. However, all students must be advanced in their studies. A minimum standard of Suzuki Book 6 is required for each soloist or ensemble member. A time limit of 6 minutes will apply. Repertoire can be either Suzuki or non-Suzuki. If a student



has performed a solo in the previous year's Showcase Concert, they are not eligible to audition again as a soloist within the following twelve months. They are, however, welcome to be a member of a group or ensemble that is auditioning the following year. Teachers are required to be involved in the audition process, making sure those students that do apply to audition, are playing at the very high standard expected of this formal concert. Audition applications close at 5pm on Monday 24th July and no late auditions will be accepted. All Applications must be submitted by email to info@suzukimuiscsa.org.au

2023 Video Auditions

All Showcase auditions will be by video. Recordings can be submitted via YouTube, Dropbox or another online platform. Auditions must be video rather than just audio recordings. Audio recordings will not be accepted for consideration. The piece presented must be as intended in the final performance – with an accompanist if required and with any cuts or changes included. The audition recordings will be timed during the audition review to make sure the time limit of 6 minutes is not exceeded. Students are required to supply their own accompanist. Please include a copy of the full score to share with the adjudicator.

Audition Review

Audition videos will be reviewed by an external adjudicator whose decision will be final. Students will be marked according to style, musicality, ensemble, tone, accuracy and general presentation. Audition results with a written report will be emailed to all applicants with enough time for successful applicants to prepare for the event.



Application Process

Audition costs are \$50 per item. Please fill out the form, which is available in PDF and Word format for download from the website <u>here</u>, and return it via email to the Suzuki Administrator. Include the video link and a copy of the score.

We ask that all applicants also submit a short biography of the performer(s) plus a bright high-resolution colour photograph that can be used in the program should the applicant be successful. The biography should include such information as the age of the child, how long they have studied music, their school, any awards they have won through their music and any other interests or hobbies they might have. The biography should be written in 3rd person and be no more than 150 words in length. The Showcase committee reserves the right to cut or edit student's biographies to fit within the scope of the published program.

Return the paper application form available <u>here</u>, a clickable link to the recording, the biography, the score and a photograph to the Suzuki Administrator by **24th July**. Payments must be made via bank transfer before the due date to enable applications to be auditioned.

Note, applications to be a featured performer at the Suzuki Showcase Concert on Sunday 17th September, 2023, are due by Monday 24th July. No late applications will be accepted.
